Up Close:

Cindy Graff Cohen

As you read this, Cindy Graff Cohen is starting a new life in Tucson, an adventure sure to include new opportunities for writing and editing. She has been editor of The Jewish Voice since 2014, with a brief break in 2016. This is her last issue.

Of course, boxes of her 55 or so past issues were on the moving van to Arizona. When she flips through the newspapers, vivid memories come back with each one.

"Every issue brings happy thoughts about all the different people I have gotten to know through this job," she says. "While it's fun to plan and write for a newspaper, it is those people who made the years meaningful."

Promoting through publications

Cohen moved from Alexandria, Virginia, to El Paso in 1996, after marrying local attorney Burton Cohen, a long-time member of Temple Mount Sinai. She fell in love with the city and got to know it better in quick order as the sole staff writer at a new newspaper called El Paso Inc. Her goal: to share the best things about the community and encourage involvement.

Her role as a local cheerleader was put to work again later when she promoted activities and shared stories about people for The Jewish Voice.

Cohen's work in journalism began in 1981 after she earned a Master's in English from the University of Alabama; she attended University of Virginia for her undergraduate English degree and a Master's in Counseling. As a journalist, she served as the editor of Antiques Monthly; a ghostwriter for "Megatrends" author John Naisbitt; and the associate editor/writer/designer/ photographer/delivery girl for a weekly paper on the coast of Maine.

When she met Burton, she was publications director at Close Up Foundation, which brought students to the nation's capital. In El Paso, she became senior marketing manager of the college English list for Houghton Mifflin's textbook division and commuted to Boston regularly. For the last seven years, she was El Paso Inc.'s weekly arts and culture columnist.

The Jewish Voice has been a special assignment that brought together her passions for promoting the Jewish community and telling a good story. Her work has taken her to countless wonderful events, such as the January 2020 Pacesetters outing at the Globo Rojo classic car museum and a lunch with the Romeo (Retired Old Men Eating Out) bunch.

"Being editor gives you an excuse to reach out to people you wouldn't ordinarily call," she adds. "I also had the inside track on all the great programs taking place!"

Gratitude to friends

While it is exciting to start a new chapter in a new city, Cohen finds it very difficult to leave dear friends in El Paso. She has so many cherished memories here with Burton, his children and grandchildren, and so many good friends. She is grateful to all of them and especially her Mah Jongg group for their support after Burton died unexpectedly. In a difficult time, those friends, along with friends like Susie and Bob May, Laura Tate Goldman, and Rabbi Ben Zeidman, were there for her.

At the Federation, she is especially thankful to Leslie Beckoff for her wealth of ideas, Janet Wechter for her creative vision for The Jewish Voice, Sue Bendalin for her help and knowledge, and Robert French for his guidance, strategic thinking and inspiration.

A good sense of humor and forgiveness for my shortcomings.

Who's your favorite Jewish hero (living or not/fictional or not) and why?

Before I converted to Judaism in 2007, I learned about the religion and culture through literature. Since I was a kid, I was drawn to books about Jewish people and Jewish life. You have spent six years writing and editing for The Jewish Voice. What would you say to encourage others to get involved with Jewish life in Greater El Paso?

Time and time again, I have seen how people of all ages have been



My wish list for the future would include growing our community, with more Jews of all ages joining congregations and supporting our organizations.

TBE founder featured at Las Cruces museum

A special exhibit at the Branigan Cultural Center in Las Cruces spotlights Frances F. Williams, one of the founders of Temple Beth-El. "Through a Different Lens: One Woman's Experience in Vietnam" describes the six months that Frances, a civilian logistician, spent there in 1967-68.

The exhibit covers a memorable Passover seder attended by the head of American Jewish War Veterans and held in a mess hall in Saigon. "Amazingly Jewish troops came in from the field, their uniforms and shoes muddy, their rifles slung over their shoulders which they had to leave at the door, their faces tired and worn," she recalls. "As they entered the mess hall I felt like I was participating in a gathering not unlike the exodus. We said our prayers, sang the Passover songs, and then said our farewells."

Frances also volunteered at an evacuation hospital and earned the name the "Cookie Lady" for distributing countless cookies to patients, thanks to the Temple Beth-El sisterhood. Sisterhood members, including Sis Druxman, Eve Holzman, Bea Klein, and Rose Wechter, baked and shipped dozens of individually wrapped cookies.

A resident of Las Cruces since 1952, Frances has been honored with the Governor's Award for Outstanding New Mexico Woman, the Governor's New Mexico Distinguished Public Service Award, and the Las Cruces Sun News 2018 Distinguished Resident. The exhibit will run at the Branigan Cultural Center at 501 North Main Street through February 6, 2021. One single spark in one Jewish heart...

each Jewish home is to light the Chanukah menorah over the course of the holiday. Early legal codes reference the tradition of some to light a menorah for every member of the household.

In his book "What is Hanukkah?" Rabbi Judah L. Magnes reflected on this tradition:

"Just as the Chanukah candles are lighted one by one from a single flame, so the tale of the miracle is passed from one [person] to another, from one house to another, and to the whole House of Israel throughout the generations. The miracle of Chanukah is thus turned inward, into the soul of each individual. For at Chanukah the injunction is that there be a candle for every household, and for greater piety a candle for every member of each household.'

Time of trouble

What do we know about the period leading up to the rebellion of Judah Maccabee and his brothers? There were differences of opinion about where the Jewish people should place their loyalty (between Egypt and the Seleucid Empire). It was a time of arguments over the

Jewish law indicates that role and politics of Hellenism as well as destructive actions of selfish people in power who would do anything for more wealth or more

> The situation in the lead-up to Antiochus IV's desecration of the Jerusalem Temple makes for fascinating reading. We like to recall that this small band of rebels was fighting against the great empire led by Antiochus IV. But the reality points not only to external forces, but also to the internal strife between the people of Israel.

> The Maccabees arose to rebel against the Hellenists. So they fought against the Seleucids and the Israelites who had sided with

Israelite against Israelite

In some ways the story of Chanukah was not only the defeat of a large army by a small one (the Maccabees succeeded not only through military prowess, but also because Antiochus IV was pulled away by a war with Parthia). It was also a civil war. Israelite pitted against Israelite for the sanctity of Israel. A war between those who

had been cowed, bought, or turned by the Seleucids against those led by Maccabee who were committed if even one to the spirit of Israel.

We often forget that the of oil, one Maccabean revolt was not only against the Seleucids. It was a battle against Jews who had brushed aside their commitment to Israel.

Chanukah is not only about our efforts to overcome evil from the outside, nor just about the miraculous story of the oil. Chanukah celebrates the ability of a few to keep the spark of Judaism alive and to rekindle the soul of Judaism for all of us. As we take the shamash to light each candle, we are reminded that Judah Maccabee was a shamash in his day. So it may be our turn in the days ahead.

As Rabbi Samson Raphael Hirsch wrote in "Judaism Eternal: Selected Essays,"

"One single spark, loyally treasured in but one single Jewish heart, is sufficient for God to set aflame once more the whole spirit of Judaism."

He continues that small cruse single soul, were to remain touched, it

is "sufficient to become the salvation of the entire sanctuary when the right time and hour has come." He teaches of the importance of every single soul, that we each are valuable and incredibly significant.






