While in El Paso, Norman connected with some Brandeis Camp alumni and got to know Sylvia. They married before Norman left El Paso. Sylvia and Norman have been married for 61 vears living in North Carolina and Florida, but if you ask her where she is from, she answers, "El Paso"



Members of the El Paso Jewish community have received the benefit of \$533,000 last year from The Jewish Community Foundation of El Paso. For the past 20 years, many individuals have contributed to the Foundation, starting funds that allowed the interest income generated to be allocated at their discretion, or by the Foundation's board. The fortunate recipients of that generosity include programs and projects of Congregation B'nai Zion, Temple Mount Sinai, Chabad, El Paso Holocaust

Lessons From the Wilderness

The Jewish people can claim so many places of origin. We come from Eden: A spiritual beacon which calls us "home" to a world of perfect peace. We come from the ark which Noah and his family built to survive the great and terrible deluge. One could also say we come from the mountains of Ararat where the ark rested as the waters of the flood diminished. Similarly, we come from Babel, and from there we were dispersed. As the generations of the Book of Genesis go by, we come time: Abram) father who came from Ur of the Chaldeans. Yet another place of origin for the Haran. Abram is called by God

takes Abraham, Sarah, and their descendants from there to Egypt and back again (and back again). You know the rest!

We can claim origin to so many places. However, most of our Torah describes us as wandering. According to the Torah, we are never in one spot for long. The Israelites are wandering and camping in the wilderness for forty years, and for most of the books of Exodus through Deuteronomy. It is in that desert where they truly become Israel. The People of Israel who are ready to enter the Land of Israel to serve the God of Israel.

It is purposeful that they become who they are when they are not stagnant. When mobile, we are forced to adapt and to

wrestle with a constantly changing reality. There in the wilderness they receive the Torah. There they accept the Covenant as a people. There they receive the Laws and the Ethics which will guide them for living and praying in the Promised Land (eventually).

Human beings learn and grow the most when removed from the normal patterns of our lives. When we are confronted by challenges, we find our way through them by building communities of support around us. Many of us experience this uniquely through the American Jewish tradition of camp. At camp we are outside of our normal patterns of living. There we must decipher what our parents have taught us, to apply their lessons to new situations.

There we strengthen our identities and our personal values by confronting new people and new


situation. At camp we build new communities of support, relationships and memories that last a lifetime.



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
