

Letter from the Director

I am grateful to all our donors who contributed so generously in 2023. Not only did we invest in our own community, but donors gave more than \$80K to the JFNA Israel Relief Campaign, which, to date, has raised over \$760M.

The monthly Café Europa programs continue to be well attended and not only create a friendly environment where El Paso and Las Cruces members can share a meal, but also enjoy a learning environment with local rabbis celebrating the holidays, and visits to White Sands Missile Museum and the El Paso History Museum.

PJ Library membership continues to grow, including military and unaffiliated families not connected to the Jewish community. We continue to connect these families with partner agencies, offering a rich array of Jewish programs.

In 2023, your dollars enabled us to support our partner agencies with \$347,800 in grants. The August 2023 digital version of the Jewish Voice lists the transformative programs produced with your help.

This year's campaign launches with a phone- athon on Sunday, February 4th. Please answer your phones when we call and share with us what makes you proud of our community! Please save the date for the Pacesetters' event, Sunday, March 3 at 12:30 PM at the Hal Marcus Gallery and Sunset Parlor.

Our 2024 campaign will provide the necessary funding to support future grants and Federation programs, which focus on adult and youth education, camp scholarships, cultural arts, and celebrating Jewish Life.

The Jewish Federation is planning an extended Jewish Film Festival in both El Paso and Las Cruces, showing award-winning films. We will also bring our community the rich Ladino musical heritage of Flory Jagoda played by from Trio Sefardi (see page 17).

The horror of October 7 diverted staff time to organizing major community gatherings to fight anti-semitism and anti-Israel rhetoric. While no credible threats have impacted El Paso and Las Cruces, we continue to monitor and respond to the wave of anti-semitism making its way through the country including on our college campuses. We continue to work with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies and our partner agencies to enhance security.



have known him over the past six years and always enjoy seeing each new piece of art he produces.

One such piece was posted on December 22, 2022, "Happy Hanukkah!", one day after our previously titled "Celebrate Chanukah" event. I was so sad that we had not collaborated sooner. but I reached out to Patrick in mid-2023 to set up a meeting. By fall 2023, Patrick agreed to collaborate with our office and license his beautiful "Happy Hanukkah" art for our now-renamed "Hanukkah@ San Jacinto Plaza" t-shirts. What inspired you to start painting?

I've always been inspired by colorful, bold artwork. When I was much younger, that inspiration came from comic books and video games. Now, I find my inspiration from the beautiful El Paso desert. I started painting on a whim after attending a "paint and wine" event at a local business. The teacher was excited by what I did and recommended that I keep painting. It's been a whirlwind ever since, and I'm so glad I picked up a paintbrush.

What inspired you to draw the Menorah (Chanukiah)? Will we see a dreidel?

Dreidel...who knows! The Menorah was something I had wanted to work on for a while. I love creating digitally because it allows for fun projects and illustrations like the Menorah Ocotillo. I drew up the Menorah because I wanted an illustration to show some love to my Jewish friends during the holiday season. I had plenty of Christmas images but none celebrating Hanukkah. The strong and resilient Ocotillo was a perfect fit for my desert menorah.

Who are your favorite artists?

I have SO many favorite artists! I love the work by locals Christin Apodaca, Zeke Pena, Jason Lucero, Juan Ornelas, and Eugenia "AO" Carmona. I also find tons of inspiration from artist Jivan Lee of Taos who paints beautiful textured landscapes out in the NM wilderness. Be sure to check out Lalo Alcaraz, Andy J Pizza, and Gemma Correll who are some of my favorite illustrators and cartoonists. Last but not least... I love the work of Texan Cruz Ortiz. His is probably the work I most admire.

What has been your favorite piece?

This is a tough one! Usually, my favorite piece is my most recent work, but these days, I really love a piece of mine titled "Guitarron," which is of my wife. She's facing away from the viewer which is meant to show how she's always leading us in the right direction. She's playing the guitarron which is the bass guitar in a Mariachi group signifying how she is my anchor. It's currently hanging in my studio/gallery.

What's the best thing about being part of the El Paso community?

The best thing about the community and El Paso is the people. The support and encouragement I've been blessed to experience from those in the art community has been incredible. We are all creating such unique work and it's an incredible time to be an artist and supporter of the arts in El Paso.

How many community collaborations have you had? What have been your top five favorites?

This is a tough one! We make it our goal each year to give back and support local charities. The best way for us to do that is through art, and 2023 was another year of giving and support. My top five experiences so far have been with El Pasoans Fighting Hunger, El Paso Children's Hospital, Animal Rescue League of El Paso, El Paso Electric, and with Mountain Star Sports (El Paso Locomotive FC).

What collaborations should we expect from you in 2024?

Well... that's also a hard one! I only have a few things cooking at the moment, but none are close to the finish line, so I best not jinx it! One project I just got done was an illustration to support World Down Syndrome Day in 2024. They should have some fun shirts and items showing support and bringing awareness for World Down Syndrome Day with an El Paso flair.

What message would you think your art conveys to the community today?

My goal through art, at its most basic level, is to bring joy to others through color. If my work is able to make others feel that same joy I feel, then it's a success. I hope that joy and warmth continues to be conveyed through each and every painting.

Finding the Anusim Center

From 1478-1834, Jewish people in what is now modernday Spain and Portugal were under attack. In an effort to fight "heresy," many people of opposing religious views were brutally attacked and the Jewish citizens were the main target. Forced to flee, convert, or be murdered by means of torture, those lucky enough to survive would abandon their Jewish heritage leaving their descendants with very little knowledge about where they come from and who they truly are. Over the years more and more of these people have made their way back to Judaism. Some convert back to Judaism and others just want to learn about the culture that was taken from their families. Today, there is the Society for Crypto-Judaic Studies and in El Paso, we have our own branch called The Anusim Center. Bringing the Jews of El Paso and the Jews of Mexico together to share a common link, our religion, but also educate everyone on what it means to be Jewish and what it means to be Anusim.





Halakha is the transliteration of a Hebrew word that means "Jewish Law." According to Jewish Law, the word "Anusim" which is also a transliteration of a Hebrew word, refers to someone who was forced to abandon Judaism and convert to another religion. What happened to Jewish people during the Spanish Inquisition is, unfortunately, not an isolated incident so the word Anusim does not only refer to the descendants of the Jewish people from this time.

Throughout a lifetime, many traditions and customs are passed down. There are things we do every day, every week, yearly, that become routine. Most people, however, know why we do these things and why they were passed down to us. Lighting Shabbat candles and saying a prayer, covering the mirrors when in mourning, or the proper way to slaughter an animal are all Jewish traditions and as Jewish people, we understand the importance of these practices. There are people out there who practice these things, and more, with no understanding of why. Upon questioning these "strange" traditions many learn that these customs come from Judaism. "Why? Why am I doing this? Why was this passed down to me?" The Anusim Center of El Paso provides a great outlet and learning tool for people who are coming back to Judaism or just want the "Why?" answered.

Those who were fortunate enough to survive were forced to flee their homes and many ended up in Mexico. While there are many centers like the Anusim Center throughout the nation, The Anusim Center of El Paso has a unique advantage being so close to Mexico. People from Mexico now have a very close outlet to learn and express themselves with people they don't know personally or haven't known for very long but are like their neighbors. Being in El Paso, many Jewish people are of Mexican descent, and most have grown up around the culture so now, the Crypto-Jews of Mexico share more than just a religious background. Every service is conducted in English and Spanish. During the average Holiday or Shabbat service at most Synagogues, a sermon and page numbers are the most to be said in between the prayers but at the Anusim Center the time is taken to explain not only what these prayers mean and why they are said but what the Jewish people of Spain and Portugal had to go through and what it means to be Jewish. This is done in English by the Rabbi and then translated into Spanish. The prayers are in Hebrew, as is traditionally done during Jewish prayer, but also in Ladino. Ladino is a language spoken by Sephardic Jews and it is a mixture of Spanish and Hebrew. Sephardim are Jewish people of Spanish or Portuguese descent. Together, we learn, pray, share our differences

and similarities with one another, but mostly, we're there for each other. This congregation provides vital support to those who, for so long, were left out in the dark.

This community is very important not only for those coming back to the Judaism but also for those of us who didn't have our religion stolen from us to learn about the struggles of our fellow Jews. We all grew up learning about this and now we have the opportunity to see the aftermath firsthand. It is our duty as Jewish people to welcome these people back with open arms. I feel so honored and privileged to be part of the Jewish community of El Paso. This extends to all the synagogues including the Anusim Center. I have been volunteering here since June and have planned many events with them. My best friend and I volunteered at the recent conference that was held here and had the opportunity to meet people from all over the country as well as Mexico. There were dancers, Ladino singers, speakers, and most importantly, community. The Anusim Center serves many purposes such as bringing people together and providing learning resources. It also shows us that it's never too late to come back to your roots. It's never too late to find out who you are and come home again.


