This last year has been proof of the impact that our system has when we come together to support communities around the world. - 500,000 people received humanitarian assistance, relief, or support

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Queen Esther, Wonder Woman of Her Day

As we celebrate International Woman's Day and in view of the upcoming holiday of Purim, it behooves us to pay homage to Queen Esther, our female ancestor and heroine of many a Purim Spiel. In fact, I've played her part myself and tried to transport myself into the year ca. 475 BCE to try to imagine her life at the court of the Persian king Ahasuerus (Xerxes) in Shushan. Deborah and Jael, Two Brave Female Judges of the Bible

In Biblical times, judges were often prophets "instructed in Divine knowledge by the inspiration of the Spirit of G-d" and civic leaders, given authority to judge "Israel as G-d's mouth to them; correcting abuses, and redressing grievances." On many occasions, the judges also served as military commanders who led Israel in battle against foreign adversaries.

Deborah in the Bible was one of these Judges. She rendered her judgments beneath a date palm tree between Ramah in

Benjamin and Bethel in the land of Ephraim.

Deborah's story is contained in the Fourth and Fifth chapters of the book of Judges. There we learn that Deborah was called to deliver the Israelites from the Canaanites as the fifth Judge. Deborah led Israel against the Canaanites, their king Jabin, and their military general Sisera, calling on a Jewish warrior named Barak to command Israel's army. To Deborah's request, Barak famously replied, "if you will go with me, then I will go; but if you will not go with me, I will not go" (Judges 4:8). Deborah agreed to accompany Barak. However, she informed him that, because of his hesitancy, "the honor shall not be yours... for the Lord will sell Sisera into the hands of a woman." (Judges 4:9).

While G-d sent Deborah the prophetess to destroy the Canaanite army, the glory, however, went to another female Judge, Jael the Kenite. As Israel routed Sisera's forces at Mount Tebor, Sisera, the Canaanite general, escaped,



seeking refuge in the tent of Jael, the wife of Heber the Kenite (Judges 4:17). But as Canaan's top military leader slept soundly, Jael shoved a tent spike through Sisera's head, killing him where he lay (Judges 4:21).

Acknowledged as one of the first pieces of Biblical poetry, Judges 5, contains the "song" of



Deborah and Barak. They praise G-d, the Israelite warriors, and Jael, but scold the tribes that failed to join the fight. Deborah served G-d and Israel as a judge for forty years.

The Society for Crypto-Judaic Studies invites proposals for presentations at its 33rd Annual Conference, Sunday, August 13 through Tuesday, August 15, 2023, in El Paso, Texas. This event is open to regional, national, and international submissions. The conference will be "in-person" only. For more details about the Society, the conference, and exciting pre-conference activities, please visit http://cryptojews.com.

We invite proposals for papers on crypto-Judaism from any discipline (e.g., anthropology, history, sociology, philosophy, literature, music, etc.) and from any geographic location or time period.

We also welcome proposals for presentations on all aspects of the Sephardic experience and that of other communities exhibiting crypto-Jewish phenomena.

The 2023 conference theme is "A Crypto-Judaic Exploration of the Borderlands." Proposals breaking new ground in research on the Texas Borderlands and in general the far northern frontier of New Spain, including Texas, Chihuahua, New Mexico, and Southern Colorado are particularly welcome.

Interested scholars and professionals, including advanced graduate students, are encouraged to submit proposals for individual research presentations or organized panels of three or four presenters. Proposals are also welcomed from individuals with personal narratives or other research related to crypto-Jews. Proposals responding to this Call should be new research, narratives, or lectures not previously presented elsewhere. Please indicate if presentation represents completed research or work in progress. Accepted proposals will have 20-30 minutes per presenter, with additional time for discussion if time allows.

Proposals should follow this format: (1) proposal title, (2) presenter name, (3) email, (4) an abstract of up to 200 words, and (5) a brief bio, including relevant affiliation and academic title if any.

For organized panels, panel organizer is responsible for providing this information for each presenter in a single document, as well as a session title and organizer brief bio.

Presenters must register to present their papers at the conference; those whose proposals are accepted enjoy a special discounted registration fee.


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


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Update: Judicial Reform Debate in Israel

Dear Friends,

As you are no doubt aware, there is currently intense debate in Israel surrounding potential reforms to Israel's judicial system, especially on matters related to the relative power of the Knesset vs the Supreme Court. We have previously sent information regarding the arguments put forward by the proponents and opponents of the reforms.

There are a growing number of experts taking the position that some changes to the current system are needed, but that the bills submitted by the governing coalition are too far reaching. See, for example, articles on the matter written by the director of the Jewish People Policy Institute, Professor Yedidya Stern, as well as Dr. Shuki Friedman, the Israel Democracy Institute's Yohanan Plesner, and former US Ambassador to Israel David Friedman. The Jewish Federation system is a supporter of the Jewish People Policy Institute, and we have partnered with the Israel Democracy Institute in a series of informative webinars on the issues that the new government in

Israel have brought to the forefront (See our recent webinars on the new Government, the LGBTQ community, and the Law of Return).

This issue will be also be among the topics we delve into in-depth at our Israel at 75 General Assembly in April.

Israel's President Isaac Herzog, in a public address last week, expressed deep concern over how the issue was dividing Israeli society: "This charged issue is on the verge of exploding.... This is a time of emergency, and the responsibility is ours. We must strive for broad agreements and not for forced submission. Playing a zero-sum game threatens us all, because whoever demands surrender today - will be forced to surrender tomorrow."

Herzog added: "My firm position is that the foundations of the Israeli democracy – including the judicial system, human rights, and freedoms - are sacred, and we must protect them - as well as the values expressed in our Declaration of Independence... It is permissible and appropriate to criticize each of the state's authorities, and it is important to understand the depth of the frustration, anger and pain that is behind the criticism of the

judiciary... It is legitimate to discuss the boundaries and relationships between the authorities - just as democracies around the world do. But through dialogue. By listening."

Herzog said he had spent the last few weeks trying to mediate between the sides, and while he admitted that he was not sure his mediation efforts would succeed, he has said that he is not willing to give up and that he hoped that the sides would reach a middle ground.

Meanwhile, numerous other concerned voices have emerged. These have included high-tech workers, former legal officials, well-known conservative political figures, former senior government officials, traditional pro-Israel stalwarts calling for North American Jewish intervention, and the current and former governors of the Bank of Israel (equivalent of the US Federal Reserve). The Prime Minister has publicly dismissed economic concerns. At the same time, yesterday, Israel's Attorney General said that the Prime Minister could not be involved in promoting the reforms, due to a conflict of interest since he is currently on trial. Finally, the controversy is starting to reach the international arena. See the

comments by US Secretary of State Antony Blinken during his visit to Israel last week, the comments of French President Macron to Prime Minister Netanyahu during the Prime Minister's visit to Paris, and the internal report of the influential bank JP Morgan in New York.

In the coming weeks, discussions and debates on these issues will continue in Israel, as the proposed reforms take their first steps through the legislative process. Jewish Federations of North America are keeping a close watch on this issue and will update as needed. Our Board of Trustees will also be discussing this issue at our Board meeting this Sunday and Monday, February 5th and 6th. 
